INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

Board of Directors Endowment for Health, Inc. and Subsidiary

We have audited the accompanying consolidated financial statements of Endowment for Health, Inc. and Subsidiary (a non-profit organization), which comprise the consolidated statements of financial position as of September 30, 2019 and 2018, and the related consolidated statements of activities and cash flows for the years then ended, and the related notes to the consolidated financial statements.

Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these consolidated financial statements in accordance with U.S. generally accepted accounting principles; this includes the design, implementation and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of the consolidated financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

Auditor's Responsibility

Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these consolidated financial statements based on our audits. We conducted our audits in accordance with U.S. generally accepted auditing standards. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audits to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the consolidated financial statements are free from material misstatement.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the consolidated financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the auditor's judgment, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the consolidated financial statements, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, the auditor considers internal control relevant to the entity's preparation and fair presentation of the consolidated financial statements in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control. Accordingly, we express no such opinion. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the consolidated financial statements.

We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinion.

Opinion

In our opinion, the consolidated financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the consolidated financial position of Endowment for Health, Inc. and Subsidiary as of September 30, 2019 and 2018, and the consolidated changes in their net assets and their consolidated cash flows for the years then ended in accordance with U.S. generally accepted accounting principles.

The consolidating information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the consolidated financial statements and certain additional procedures, including comparing and reconciling such information directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the consolidated financial statements or to the consolidated financial statements themselves, and other additional procedures in accordance with U.S. generally accepted auditing standards. In our opinion, the consolidating information is fairly stated, in all material respects, in relation to the consolidated financial statements as a whole.

Notes to Consolidated Financial Statements

Nature of Activities

Endowment for Health, Inc. (the Foundation) is a state-wide, private, non-profit foundation dedicated to improving the health of the people of New Hampshire, especially those who are vulnerable and underserved.

The Foundation was established in 1999 as a result of the sale of Blue Cross Blue Shield New Hampshire to Anthem Insurance. It was created for the purpose of improving the health and reducing the burden of illness of the people of New Hampshire. It accomplishes this purpose by awarding grants, making mission investing/program-related investments, and providing technical and financial assistance to health-related programs, organizations and projects benefiting the people of New Hampshire. The Foundation's spending policy requires a percentage of these funds be distributed annually in accordance with Internal Revenue Code requirements.

Since 2001, the Foundation has awarded nearly 1,400 grants, totaling more than \$53 million, to support a wide range of health-related programs and projects in New Hampshire. The major source of the Foundation's revenue is investment income.

In July 2007, Health Strategies of New Hampshire, Inc. (Health Strategies), the Foundation's wholly-owned subsidiary, was created in order to conduct initiatives, projects, programs, research and data collection and analysis, independently and with others, to address key issues and public policies that promote the health of New Hampshire residents. The major source of its revenue is grant income.

1. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Newly Adopted Accounting Principle and Reclassifications

In 2019, the Foundation adopted Financial Accounting Standards Board (FASB) Accounting Standards Update (ASU) No. 2016-14, *Presentation of Financial Statements of Not-for-Profit Entities*, which makes targeted changes to the not-for-profit financial reporting model. The new ASU marks the completion of the first phase of a larger project aimed at improving not-for-profit financial reporting. Under the new ASU, net asset reporting is streamlined and clarified. The existing three category classification of net assets is replaced with a simplified model that combines temporarily restricted and permanently restricted into a single category called "net assets with donor restrictions." New disclosures highlight restrictions on the use of resources that make otherwise liquid assets unavailable for meeting near term financial requirements. The ASU also imposes several new requirements related to reporting expenses.

Basis of Presentation

Net assets and revenues, expenses, gains and losses are classified as follows based on the existence or absence of donor-imposed restrictions:

Net assets without donor restrictions: Net assets that are not subject to donor-imposed restrictions and may be expended for any purpose in performing the primary objectives of the Foundation. These net assets may be used at the discretion of the Foundation's management and the Board of Directors.

Net assets with donor restrictions: Net assets subject to stipulations imposed by donors and grantors. Some donor restrictions are temporary in nature; those restrictions are to be met by actions of the Foundation or by the passage of time. Other donor restrictions are perpetual in nature, whereby the donor has stipulated the funds be maintained in perpetuity. During 2019, the Endowment received a contribution in the amount of \$1,950,395 from the New Hampshire Medical Malpractice Joint Underwriting Association (JUA). The Endowment has identified the JUA funds as the Forward Fund on the balance sheet. At September 30, 2019, net assets with donor restrictions substantively consisted of the restricted JUA contribution to be held in perpetuity, the income earned from which is to be used to promote aid to health care providers servicing medically underserved populations.

All contributions are considered to be contributions without donor restrictions unless specifically restricted by the donor. Amounts received that are designated for future periods or restricted by the donor for specific purposes are reported as increases in net assets with donor restrictions. When a donor restriction expires, net assets with donor restrictions are reclassified to net assets without donor restrictions and reported in the consolidated statement of activities as net assets released from restrictions. Contributions with donor restrictions whose restrictions are met in the same year as received are reflected as net assets without donor restrictions in the accompanying financial statements.

Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with U.S. generally accepted accounting principles (U.S. GAAP) requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets, liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements. Estimates also affect the reported amounts of revenue and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Principles of Consolidation

The accompanying financial statements include the consolidated financial statements of the Foundation and Health Strategies. All significant intercompany accounts and transactions have been eliminated in consolidation.

The Foundation and its subsidiary have different fiscal years. The Foundation's fiscal year is October 1 to September 30 and Health Strategies' fiscal year is July 1 to June 30.

For the September 30, 2019 and 2018 consolidated financial statements, Health Strategies presents the twelve months October 1, 2018 to September 30, 2019 and October 1, 2017 to September 30, 2018, respectively.

Cash and Cash Equivalents

For the purpose of the statements of cash flows, the Foundation and its subsidiary consider cash equivalents to consist of interest-bearing, demand bank accounts.

Money market accounts and other highly liquid debt securities held by its investment managers are considered investments and not cash equivalents, since it is the Foundation's Board's intention to invest these funds for long-term purposes.

<u>Investments</u>

Investments in equity securities with readily determinable fair values and all investments in debt securities are measured at fair value in the consolidated statements of financial position as provided by investment managers. Other investments, for which no such quotations or valuations are readily available, are carried at fair value as estimated by management using audited or unaudited values provided by external investment managers. The Foundation reviews and evaluates the valuations provided by the investment managers and believes that these valuations are a reasonable estimate of fair value, but are subject to uncertainty and, therefore, may differ from the value that would have been used had a ready market for the investments existed.

Investments in general are exposed to various risks, such as interest rates, credit, and overall market volatility. As such, it is reasonably possible that changes could materially affect the amounts reported in the statements of financial position.

Grants

The Foundation recognizes a liability and corresponding expense for unconditional grants in the amount expected to be paid when grants are approved by the Board of Directors and the award is communicated to the grantee. Such liabilities are not recorded at their present values using a discount rate commensurate with the risks involved because the present value is not materially less than the amounts expected to be paid. Conditional grants approved by the Board of Directors, if any, are recorded when the recipient organizations meet the conditions.

Income and Excise Taxes

The Foundation and its subsidiary are exempt from federal income taxes under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code. The Internal Revenue Code imposes a federal excise tax equal to 2% (reduced to 1% if certain requirements are met) on its net investment income (principally interest, dividends and net realized capital gains less expenses incurred in the production of investment income). The income tax filings for the tax years before 2015 are no longer subject to examination by federal and state taxing authorities.

The Foundation has adopted the provisions of FASB Accounting Standards Codification Subtopic 740-10-25, *Income Taxes - Overall - Recognition*, related to uncertain tax positions. The Foundation does not believe there are any material uncertain tax positions and, accordingly, it has not recognized any liability for unrecognized tax benefits.

Expense Allocation

The financial statements report certain categories of expenses that are attributable to both program and management and general. These expenses require allocation on a reasonable basis consistently applied. Expenses that are attributable to both program and management and general include salaries and benefits, communication activities, technology, office expense and building and related expenses. The allocation is based on the proportion of time spent on each program by staff.

Subsequent Events

The Foundation has considered events occurring through January 27, 2020, which was the date that the financial statements were available to be issued.

2. Availability and Liquidity of Financial Assets

The Foundation regularly monitors liquidity required to meet its operating needs and other contractual commitments, while also striving to optimize its available funds. The Foundation has various sources of liquidity at its disposal, including cash and cash equivalents and investments.

For purposes of analyzing resources available to meet general expenditures over a 12-month period, the Foundation considers all expenditures related to its ongoing operating activities as well as the conduct of services undertaken to support those operating activities.

In addition to financial assets available to meet general expenditures over the next 12 months, the Foundation operates with a balanced budget and anticipates collecting sufficient revenue to cover expenditures not covered by donor-restricted resources or, where appropriate, borrowings. Refer to the statements of cash flows, which identify the sources and uses of the Organization's cash and cash equivalents.

^{*}Flexible capital strategies broadly refer to long/short equity and absolute return investments. These strategies typically have expanded opportunity sets and are less-benchmark aware. Equity focused strategies seek to capture some upside in equity markets while protecting against the downside during periods of market declines. Absolute return investments (which include but are not limited to long/short credit, merger arbitrage, distressed, and relative value) seek to deliver positive returns which are less correlated to the broad equity and fixed income markets.

4. Mission Related Investments

The Foundation loaned the New Hampshire Community Loan Fund, Inc. (NHCLF) \$1,000,000 in July 2004 (renewed in July 2012), \$350,000 in July 2006 (renewed in July 2014 and July 2019), and \$1,000,000 in August 2017, upon renewal in July 2019, an additional \$150,000 increasing the amount loaned to \$2,500,000. The purpose of these loans is to assist the NHCLF to provide access to financing and support for people with low and moderate income. Under the terms of the agreements, NHCLF pays the Foundation based on an interest annual rate of 5%. The principal is due and payable in July 2022, May 2029, and August 2027, respectively.

5. Fair Value Measurements

U.S. GAAP establish a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. Fair value is defined as the exchange price that would be received for an asset or paid to transfer a liability (an exit price) in the principal or most advantageous market for the asset or liability in an orderly transaction between market participants on the measurement date. Fair value hierarchy requires an entity to maximize the use of observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs when measuring fair value. The three levels of inputs used to measure fair value are:

- Level 1: Quoted prices (unadjusted) for identical assets or liabilities in active markets that the entity has the ability to access as of the measurement date.
- Level 2: Significant other observable inputs other than Level 1 prices, such as quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities, quoted prices in markets that are not active, and other inputs that are observable or can be corroborated by observable market data.
- Level 3: Significant unobservable inputs that reflect an entity's own assumptions about the assumptions that market participants would use in pricing an asset or liability.

6. Grants Payable

For the years ended September 30, 2019 and 2018, the Foundation awarded grants totaling \$2,372,211 and \$2,233,948, respectively. As of September 30, 2019 and 2018, the unpaid grants payable balance was \$833,087 and \$918,745, respectively. Future grant payments as of September 30, 2019 are related to grants awarded in fiscal year 2019.

7. Lease Commitments

During the year ended September 30, 2019, the Foundation renewed its operating lease for office space which expires in August 2023. Based on the terms of the lease, the base rent is \$31,725 for the first year of the lease with a 2.5% annual increase thereafter. In addition to base rent, the Foundation is responsible for its share of real estate taxes, insurance, and common area maintenance and utilities that service the property, which is currently \$21,500 annually.

In addition, during the year ended September 30, 2018, the Foundation entered into an operating lease for a copier. The lease expires in September 2023 and requires a monthly payment of \$195.

For the years ended September 30, 2019 and 2018, rent expense was \$53,291 and \$49,986, respectively.

8. Concentration of Credit Risk

The Foundation maintains its cash balance in a national bank. The Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation (FDIC) insures the balance up to \$250,000. The bank has collateralized all deposits for the Foundation in excess of the FDIC limit.

In the normal course of business, the Foundation utilizes counterparties which primarily include a bank, investment fund managers, and an investment advisor. In the event that these counterparties do not fulfill their obligations, the Foundation may be exposed to risk. The risk of default depends on the creditworthiness of the counterparty or issuer of the instrument. It is the Foundation's policy to review, as necessary, the credit standing of each counterparty.

9. Retirement Savings Plan

The Foundation has a 403(b) defined contribution plan covering substantially all of its employees who have completed six months of service. The Foundation contributes 5% of base salary to the plan with no employee contribution required. Additionally, the Foundation matches employee salary deferral contribution dollar for dollar up to an additional 5% of base salary. For the years ended September 30, 2019 and 2018, retirement savings expense was \$74,367 and \$73,699, respectively.

11. Funds Held by Others

The Foundation has the right to recommend grant distributions from a donor-advised fund maintained at the New Hampshire Charitable Foundation (NHCF). Pursuant to the terms of the resolution establishing this fund, property contributed by unrelated parties to NHCF is held as a separate fund designated for the benefit of the Foundation. The Board of Directors of NHCF has been granted the power to re-designate the funds contributed by unrelated parties if the Foundation is incapable of fulfilling its mission.

The fund is not included in these financial statements since the fund is not an asset of the Foundation and NHCF has the ability to re-designate funds contributed by unrelated parties. The total market value of the fund was approximately \$476,974 and \$483,767 at September 30, 2019 and 2018, respectively. During 2019, no funds were distributed from this fund. During 2018, \$50,000 was distributed from this fund.

12. Endowment Funds and Net Assets

The State of New Hampshire enacted the Uniform Prudent Management of Institutional Funds Act (UPMIFA) effective July 1, 2008, the provisions of which apply to endowment funds existing on or established after that date. The Foundation's endowment consists of a donor-restricted fund established for improving the health of the people of New Hampshire. As required by U.S. GAAP, net assets associated with endowment funds are classified and reported based on the existence or absence of donor-imposed restrictions.

The Board of Trustees of the Foundation has interpreted UPMIFA as allowing the Foundation to appropriate for expenditure or accumulate so much of an endowment fund as the Foundation determines to be prudent for the uses, benefits, purposes, and duration for which the endowment fund is established, subject to the intent of the donor as expressed in the gift instrument.

As a result of this interpretation, the Foundation classifies as net assets with donor restrictions (held in perpetuity) (a) the original value of gifts donated to the perpetual endowment, (b) the original value of subsequent gifts to the perpetual endowment, and (c) accumulations to the perpetual endowment made in accordance with the direction of the applicable donor gift instrument at the time the accumulation is added to the fund. The remaining portion of the donor-restricted endowment fund that is not classified in net assets with donor restrictions (held in perpetuity) is classified as net assets with donor restrictions until those amounts are appropriated for expenditure by the Foundation in a manner consistent with the standard of prudence prescribed by UPMIFA. In accordance with UPMIFA, the Foundation considers the following factors in making a determination to appropriate or accumulate donor-restricted endowment funds: (1) the duration and preservation of the fund, (2) the purpose of the donor-restricted endowment funds, (3) general economic conditions, (4) the possible effect of inflation and deflation, (5) the expected total return from income and the appreciation of investments, (6) other resources of the Foundation, and (7) the investment policies of the Foundation.

From time to time, the fair value of assets associated with individual donor-restricted endowment funds may fall below the level that the donor or UPMIFA requires the Foundation to retain as a fund of perpetual duration. The Foundation's current practice is to spend from underwater endowment funds unless otherwise precluded by donor intent or relevant laws and regulations. The Endowment is in the process of revising their spending policy to incorporate a policy for spending from underwater endowment funds. As of September 30, 2019, there were no deficiencies of this nature associated with the individual donor-restricted endowment fund.

Investment Return Objectives, Risk Parameters and Strategies: The Foundation has adopted investment and spending policies for endowment assets that attempt to provide a predictable stream of funding to programs supported by its endowment funds, while also maintaining the purchasing power of those endowment assets over the long term. Accordingly, the investment process seeks to achieve an after-cost total real rate of return, including investment income and capital appreciation, which exceeds the annual distribution with acceptable levels of risk. The real return objective for the Foundation is 5% over a long-time horizon, net of any fees. In order to have a reasonable probability of earning this return, the Board of Directors adopts asset allocation policies each year based on the current market conditions. Actual returns in any given year may vary from this amount. Investment risk is measured in terms of the total endowment fund; investment assets and allocation between asset classes and strategies are managed in order to avoid exposing the fund to unacceptable levels of risk.

Spending Policy: The Foundation has a spending policy which limits the amount spent from accumulated earnings on funds maintained in perpetuity functioning as endowment as no greater than 6% of the fair market value of the assets of the Foundation's endowment funds (calculated on the basis of market values determined at least quarterly and averaged over a period of 3 or more years). Spending greater than 6% requires approval of at least seventy percent (70%) of the entire Board and thirty (30) days' prior written notice to the Director of Charitable Trusts, Charitable Trusts Unit, Office of the New Hampshire Attorney General. This is consistent with the Foundation's objective to preserve and grow its assets over the long term.
